Scratch Ice Cream coming to Brookfield

Business moving into Yo Mama! location

BROOKFIELD Sweet-treat lovers will see a swap from frozen yogurt to ice cream in Brookfield this

Ice cream fans can look forward to a new business bringing their favorite chilly dishes to Brookfield since Scratch Ice Cream announced they will be opening a new location at the now-exiting Yo Mama!.

The Milwaukee-based Scratch Ice Cream currently serves their treats at Crossroads Collective, 2238 N. Farwell Ave., Milwaukee, and at Zocalo Food Truck Park, 636 S. 6th Street. The ice cream is also available at over 30 restaurants and local groceries.

The business, co-owned by Ryan and Justin Povlick, makes their ice cream from scratch. They plan to bring all of their flavors to Brookfield at 2205 N. Calhoun Road — while also serving scoops, cones, soft-serve, sundaes, shakes, malts and ice cream sandwiches.

The ice cream toppers, including cookie dough, chocolate sauce and more, are also homemade. The business first launched in 2015.

Perfect fit

The move made sense for the business, as Ryan's and Justin's aunt is the owner of Yo Mama!. Scratch Ice

Cream actually first launched with ice cream pints sold at Yo Mama! locations.

"There's a lot more room there," Justin said. "There's not much of a build-out that we had to do there to make it into a kitchen and a retail location ... we've always been kind of looking to get something out west. It just so happened that my aunt and uncle were leaving, so it's perfect timing for us."

The business aims to open mid-May or June 1 at the latest.

Becky Berger, owner of Yo Mama!, said they will keep their Wauwatosa location open, but they decided to close the Brookfield location because they felt it was time to downsize. They have some to-beannounced plans for their Wauwatosa location.

"My nephews own Scratch Ice Cream and they really needed a bigger space to be able to do their wholesaling and their retail," Berger said. "Their current space is really small and they're growing so fast. So it turned out to be a perfect winwin situation.'

Berger said she is thankful to the Brookfield community, as she's been hearing many stories from customers about their time spent at Yo Mama!

"Just a huge thank you to everyone who has supported us," she said. "We have a lot regulars and a lot of families ... we will miss them."

Board of Education approves library renovations proposal

BROOKFIELD — The Elmbrook Board of Education approved renovation of the Brookfield Elementary School library on March 8 in a 5-2 vote.

Glen Allgaier, board member, made a motion to approve the proposal at a cost not to exceed \$448,940 as presented "with the recognition that that will come back to the Finance and Operations Committee for a guaranteed maximum price and that a rigorous set of metrics be developed for the effectiveness of the design," according to a draft of the meeting minutes.

Scott Wheeler, board president, and Linda Boucher, board member, cast the dissenting votes.

Boucher questioned how the renovation will affect academics. She asked the board if having a nicer library will impact the district's reading scores.

"I didn't see any need for spending a half a million dollars on something that did not affect academics directly. I thought, maybe the money, a half a million dollars could be best spent, maybe having tutors, other things that are directly going to maybe have some type of direct instruction program for kids in reading, anything, other things," Boucher said.

Chris Thompson, chief strategy officer, said there are several objectives for the renovation. He said the elementary schools are different from high school due to

Waukesha County District Attorney Opper to retire in 2024

Says 'It's been a good long career'

WAUKESHA — Waukesha County District Attorney Susan Opper said she will not seek re-election when her term is up in 2024.

"I will be retiring at the end of my term which is at the end of 2024. 33 years is enough! Lol," Opper said in an email.

Opper said her age, which she didn't disclose, played into her decision.

"It's been a good long career and I need to move on and enjoy some retirement years," she said.

She doesn't have any postretirement plans since it is two years away. She hasn't had any time to reflect on her achievements in her long career. What she is grateful for is the ability to help crime victims and give them closure and answers in some cases, she said.

A challenge for Opper as DA has been a lack of resources. Opper said the amount of attorneys assigned to the DA's office has not changed significantly or kept on pace with the population growth in the county.

She added as state employees, the wages make it hard to recruit good candidates. Opper said it is a shame that the people the office does have work for such minimal pay for such an important job.

What she has a passion for is making people feel heard. "The highlight is making

people feel safe and making them feel like their case matters," Opper said.

She added it continues to be rewarding working closely with law enforcement on cases and keeping the community safe.

Opper served as the county's acting district attorney after former DA Brad Schimel was elected Wisconsin attorney general in 2015. His attorney general term lasted until 2019. She was officially appointed to the position full-time by former Gov. Scott Walker a month later.

Opper, a Town of Delafield resident who has spent more than 20 years in the district attorney's office, was promoted from assistant to deputy district attorney. She was selected over Delafield Town Chairman Paul Kanter, an assistant U.S. attorney with approximately 30 years' experience as a criminal prosecu-

Schimel endorsed Opper as his replacement, calling her a "shining star."

Opper was re-elected as Waukesha County DA in 2016 and 2020.

The DA still has two years in office and her practical goal is to make the office paperless.

"My ultimate goal is to leave the office in good standing with a lot of good people and ready for the next person to step in and take it over," Opper said.
