



For the Geier family, the Hulk is a reason to stop, or at least, slow down to wave hello. Katie Geier said her sons, Everett, 7, and Jackson, 3, will ask where they are going based on whether when they leave

OCONOMOWOC — John and Lavinia Rockwell Park officially opened on June 30 with a ribbon cutting ceremony. Friends of Oconomowoc Parks and Trails (FOPT) held a fundraiser in the Isthmus District at the park located at 517 N. Lake Road on July 1 for the fireworks. The money raised will go toward FOPT's mission including phase two completion of the park which is planned to begin soon.

City Parks, Recreation & Forestry Director Craig Hoeppner sees the ribbon cutting as a way to say thanks to supporters. The city is currently in the design process for phase two of the park build which they hope to begin building later this year.

"(The) design is expected to be completed in late summer," Hoeppner said. "We have applied for an additional DNR grant and should learn if it is successful in late summer as well. Construction will likely happen in late 2023 and early 2024."

Phase two features are planned to include a front porch, accessible walkways, restrooms, a plaza area, drop-off zone/handicap parking and other park amenities.

During the ribbon cutting ceremony Oconomowoc Mayor Bob Magnus was on hand. His speech was about the community

working together to create a legacy park for this generation and the next. Magnus said the city is grateful for where they are with the park and looking forward to future improvements in phase two.

### Johnson is new Hartland-Lakeside



### School District superintendent

HARTLAND — After a six-month search, the Hartland-Lakeside Board of Education hired Tina Johnson last month as the district's new superintendent.

Her start date will be July 17, according to a letter from Tiffany Hawley, Hartland-Lakeside School District school board president, to HLSD staff and parents.

Johnson received her Master of Arts in Educational Leadership at St. Xavier University and her Bachelor of Music Education and Vocal Performance at Wartburg College, according to the letter.

She has been the director of Benefits Administration and Wellness for the last five years in the Janesville School District and has been advising, reviewing and contributing to all district-level decisions as a senior cabinet member.

Johnson's past experience includes working as the music education K-12 coordinator in Janesville, principal of Rock University High School in Janesville, the assistant director of administrative and human services in Janesville, RTI coordinator/academic interventionist at the Woods School in Lake Geneva, pre K-8 music education, fine arts teacher at the Woods School in Lake Geneva, K-8 music education teacher in Green Oaks, Libertyville, Illinois, and music coordinator, choral, assistant band director in McHenry High School in McHenry, Illinois, according to the letter. Last month, the HLSD board held a

special meeting to approve the terms of employment of Johnson as the new superintendent. Prior to that, the board had named as finalists: David Muñoz, superintendent of the Mosinee School District, and Jerry Sardina, superintendent of Iron Mountain Public Schools.

Both candidates dropped out of consideration and now are finalists for the Menomonee Falls School District superintendent position.
