Derek, TJ complete Watt bros 'trifecta'

Brothers have jerseys retired at alma mater

PEWAUKEE — For one night, Derek and TJ Watt got to be kids again.

And the amount of kids that showed up to see the two Pewaukee legends have their jerseys retired on May 5 was more than enough proof that their legacies have had an immeasurable impact on the next generation of football players in southeastern Wisconsin.


An event years in the making, the No. 20 of Derek Watt and the No. 16 of TJ Watt will never be worn again following the Watt Jersey Retirement Ceremony held at Pewaukee's football field.

"TJ and I have lived our entire lives together," Derek said. "We lived in a shared bedroom growing up. We've lived in the same neighborhood the last three years in Pittsburgh. We've always done everything together. I wouldn't have wanted to do it with anybody else."

They join their older brother and future NFL hall of famer JJ Watt, and current Wisconsin athletic director Chris McIntosh as the only Pirates to have their jerseys enshrined by the school.

'We're all in this together'

Mudtech LLC works to keep the highways clean for fifth year in a row

NASHOTAH — Trash along Highway 16 has been a hot topic of conversation among residents recently, and in anticipation of Earth Day on April 22, residents expressed concerns over social media. Some groups worked to keep the highways clean through the Adopt-A-Highway program, and Mudtech LLC, jumped in on the action on April 24, following a five-year tradition.

Mudtech is a company in Nashotah that focuses on mudjacking, concrete repair, asphalt repair and basement problem repairs. Clint Johnson and his business partner, Steve Gapp, started Mudtech 16 years ago

"Like everything we've ever done from starting the company itself, we just do it. We don't wait for somebody to tell us or give us permission. If something's wrong, and we have the means to make it better, we do," said Johnson. "You can't save the world if you don't do your part here and there."

Having the resources and team to get the job done, Mudtech started taking on the highways in 2018. They participate in the Highway 16 cleanup at least once a year in the spring and sometimes make a second trip out to the highway. The group has also made other cleanup trips, including to the shores of Lake Michigan, Johnson said.

Johnson said he's always noticed the trash along the highways.

"It looks ugly, it shows people's carelessness and it's not good for the environment," Johnson said, adding that no matter what, it shouldn't be there

shouldn't be there.

The group started the cleanup April 24

morning around 8:15 a.m. and worked until 2 p.m. They picked up trash along Highway

C to Highway 83, working eastbound in the eastbound lane, on the right side or south

Johnson said the trash was definitely more than usual, and the group collected a mountain of trash bags. Similar to residents in the area, Johnson has seen trash blowing out of garbage trucks and believes this, along with trash unintentionally blowing out of cars on the highways, could be part of the problem.

Counties maintain their own roads and also have a contract with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to help maintain the state roads, Waukesha County Director of Public Works Allison Bussler said. Waukesha County ultimately decides how it will maintain the county highways, and it has the Adopt-A-Highway program in place for volunteers to contribute.

"For county highways we would encourage people to work through our Adopt-A-Highway program," Bussler said, adding that when it comes to state highways, the county is not in charge. "We have been receiving a number of complaints mostly along state highways."

Johnson and his team heard about the influx of complaints regarding the trash. However, he said it had no impact on their decision to do the cleanup. The group had been planning on it prior to hearing resident complaints, to continue their years of tradition.

"It's one thing to complain and make an argument, but if you're not going to offer a solution and point fingers at somebody else, you're part of the problem," Johnson said. "We're all in this together."

"This is a rare and prestigious honor, one that is only reserved for the most accomplished and dedicated athletes who have made an incredible impact not only in the football program, but also in the community," Pewaukee athletics and activities director Jeff Behrens said.

"Derek and TJ are no strangers to the game of football. They've been playing since they were young and they have both gone on to achieve great success at the collegiate and professional levels. But before they were stars for the Badgers and in the NFL, they were stars at Pewaukee High

Derek, a 2011 graduate from Pewaukee, still holds the single-season record for rushing yards and points. He was the Associated Press Wisconsin Player of the Year and Woodland Conference Player of the Year in 2010, an all-state linebacker, and a first-team all-conference performer at four different positions — inside linebacker, running back, kicker and punter.

Derek said he nearly had to kick in an NFL game due to an injury, bringing up his consecutive extra-points-made record with the Pirates. Though after pulling his quad with the Badgers practicing his kicking game on the side, he left his glory days of kicking back in Pewaukee.

"Being here tonight, it takes me back to when we were kids playing pickup football games behind those bleachers while the varsity games took place," Derek Watt said. "Of course we all had dreams of one day being professional athletes. But it all started with the first real goal to be on the varsity football team at Pewaukee.

"If you would have told that younger version of me back then that I'd have my jersey retired, I would have thought that was the coolest thing in the world. And I still do standing here tonight."

TJ Watt, who graduated from Pewaukee in 2013, has played alongside Derek at the high school, collegiate and professional level. With the Pirates, TJ was also first team all-conference at four different positions, earning the honor at defensive end, tight end, quarterback and punter, then truly blossomed as an edge rusher in Madi-

"We grew up in Steeplechase, which is the neighborhood right behind the high school, and every morning and every afternoon I'd walk to and from school past (the football) field and I'd always think to myself how many cool and special moments that I saw take place right here in this field, and how I wanted more than anything for my buddies and I to have those special moments as well," TJ said. "And to be here right now, it's so surreal. To be up here with Chris McIntosh, a Pewaukee legend, Derek Watt ... JJ as well, it's bevond anything we could have ever imagined.'

The eldest Watt, JJ, who graduated in 2007 from PHS, was unable to attend the ceremony due to a prior obligation. But joining the two Watt brothers being honored on the field were their parents, John and Connie; Derek's wife, Gabriella, and his two children, Logan and Brayden; TJ's

wife, Dani, a former two-sport standout at Waukesha West; and the aforementioned McIntosh, a 1995 PHS grad, along with his wife, Deann and son, Ethan.

"They remind us that no dream is too big, no goal too lofty and that with hard work and perseverance, anything is possible," Behrens said.

Both Watt brothers got choked up men-

tioning their late grandfather, who they said came to nearly practice and shouted out classic sayings like "dump him" and 'first and 10, do it again" during games, none of which he missed.

"TJ and I both carry this card from his memorial service," Derek said, holding it up. "Since he's passed we look at it before every single game. I just know that he's

looking down on us with the biggest smile on his face.'

They were also grateful for the support from their parents, the school, former classmates, teammates and coaches, trainers, community and the path JJ paved before them. Derek even gave a shout-out to the Pewaukee lunch ladies.

'My mom always says it takes a village or a community to raise a family, and that couldn't be more true for our story," TJ said.

'This isn't just our night. You think I got myself here, you're kidding yourself. There's so many people that helped us along the way that wanted to see us succeed.

Of course, both Watt brothers have gone on to have enormous success since their days in lake country.

Like JJ, they went on to play for the University of Wisconsin. Derek, a fullback, was then selected in the sixth round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the San Diego Chargers and spent the last three seasons playing for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

'To join JJ ... just to kind of complete the trifecta is special," Derek said. "It's incredible. This was a dream and it just started out on the varsity football team. And now to be here playing in the NFL and having our jerseys retired next to each other is so

TJ came out one year later, and the Steelers picked him in the first round. Two years later, he was a finalist for the NFL Defensive Player of the Year award before winning it in 2021. That same year he inked a four-year extension worth over \$112 million and tied the single-season NFL record for sacks.

"It's been the greatest joy of my life to have two of my best friends, my brothers, be a phone call away to show me the blueprint of how to be a great man in the community, obviously to be a great football player," TJ said. "I'm just so happy and excited to call them my brothers.'

After speaking in front of a large crowd stationed in the bleachers, Derek and TJ went well over their allotted time of 15 minutes signing autographs for all the kids in attendance. They hoped that their jersey retirement ceremony served as an inspiration to those with similar dreams and aspirations

"I don't take this for granted," Derek said. "I hope that my journey has and will inspire future generations to fulfill their dreams as well.

Derek's football future is currently unknown, as the 30-year old became a free agent after the 2022 season. TJ, 28, has dealt with his share of injury setbacks, including multiple knee surgeries while with the Badgers and a torn pectoral suffered in Week 1 last season. But regardless of what the future holds, both will always be revered as two of the best to ever do it from Pewaukee — a place they're proud to call home.

'If there's anything I want to leave you guys, with all the youth athletes out there, is I want to be that blueprint for you," TJ said. "Let us be the blueprint for you that it is possible. Because at the end of the day we're all just kids from Pewaukee, and if we made it, so can you.'
