Spring Maintenance Tips for your Home

Just as spring is a good time for cleaning, it is also a good time for homeowners to do their spring maintenance on their homes. Doing simple preventative maintenance to your house will help the materials used to build it last longer and avoid expensive repair bills later.

Outside Maintenance

- ☐ Make sure your gutters and downspouts are clear of debris that may block the flow of water from your house.
- ☐ Ensure that landscaping around the foundation starts at 8 inches down from the top of your foundation wall and slopes away from the home.
- ☐ Properly grade the area under your downspouts and around your house so that rainwater flows away from the foundation.
- ☐ Caulk around windows, doors, chimney, foundation, and other common leakage points if needed.
- ☐ Inspect for water leaks by checking overhangs, awnings, and exposed siding where snow and water might collect, causing materials to decay.
- ☐ Clean and refinish your wood deck if needed and nail any raised boards; hammer in any popped nails.

- by National Association of Home Builders Inspect the paint to see if there are any cracks and/or exposed wood. If you find some scrape it, apply primer, and more paint.
 - ☐ Inspect the shingles and flashing on the roof.
 - Open hose bibs

Inside Maintenance

- ☐ Inspect, repair, and clean the screen doors and windows
- ☐ Check to see if your air filter needs to be changed on your air conditioner.
- Clean air conditioning coils, and drain pans.
- ☐ Clean dehumidifier coils, check operation
- ☐ Change batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
- ☐ Clean the inside of the exhaust hose that runs from the back of your dryer and vents to the outside.
- ☐ Check the weather stripping on all windows.
- ☐ Test that your sump pump is working properly
- Remove, clean, and store storm windows. Put screens up.
- ☐ Make sure your refrigerator door seals tightly. If your refrigerator has coils vacuum the coils.

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How to Find an Honest Contractor

Severe weather may be approaching with the arrival of the winter months. If Mother Nature damages your home, you may need to call a professional for help. Unfortunately, not all professionals are looking out for a homeowner's best interest. After natural or manmade disasters, unscrupulous contractors try to profit from a community's misfortune.

You may not be able to stop unexpected damage to your home, but a fly-by-night contractor is one disaster you can prevent. There are a few simple steps you can take to ensure you hire a reputable professional. You can follow these guidelines when evaluating any potential contractor, whether for post-disaster repairs or a planned renovation to your home.

Here are some guidelines to keep in mind:

Price and payment

- Don't get pressured into signing a contract immediately. You should not be told that you need to sign a contract that day or risk a price increase.
- Paying a deposit of anywhere from 20 percent to 50 percent is typical; however, you should not be asked to pay the full cost in advance before work begins.
- Make sure you're comfortable with the payment options. You should not be asked to pay cash to a salesperson instead of a check, money order or credit card.

References

- Confirm that the contractor has a verifiable mailing address for their business.
- Check https://dsps.wi.gov/Pages/ SelfService/LicenseLookUp.aspx to ensure the business has no unresolved complaints.



- Ask the contractor to provide references for past work and be sure the references can be reached.
- Check out the business on consumer review sites such as Home-Advisor, Houzz, etc. Remember to take the good with the bad when reading online reviews.

Contract and completion

- Be cautious of anyone who tells you that "a contract won't be necessary." Insist on a complete and clearly written contract signed by you and the contractor.
- Ensure the final payment is due once the job is completely finished and you are satisfied. Find out if any of the work requires city or county inspection, confirm that it is done and that you have paperwork proving it before making the final payment.

Residential Construction Offers High Paying Career Paths

Careers in residential construction are rewarding professionally and financially. Skilled trades such as carpentry or plumbing do not require a four-year degree. In addition, many skills tradespeople do not have to wait to complete training to start earning income. Apprentice opportunities in the skilled trades allow students can earn while they learn. Once training is complete, skilled trades professionals have strong earning potential.

According to the latest Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and a National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) analysis, half of the payroll workers in construction earn more than \$54,540 and the top 25% make at least \$77,030. The BLS publishes wages for more than 400 occupations in construction. Here is a closer look at the median salaries among the highest-paid wages in construction based on the most recent data available (2022).

Plumbers: The median wage for plumbers was \$60,070 in 2022. Plumbers install, repair, and maintain pipes in residential, commercial and/or industrial buildings. In general, plumbers are excellent listeners and problem-solvers. As long as there are complex water systems in and outside of homes, there will be a need for reliable plumbers.

Electricians: Qualified electricians are always in demand. The median wage for electricians was \$59,300. Electricians have excellent analytical skills, adept at diagnosing problems and work with a variety of tools and technology.

Brickmasons: Laying brick is one of the oldest and most respected trades in the construction industry. Masonry construction uses brick, stone, marble, granite, travertine, limestone, concrete block, glass block, stucco,



and tile. The median wage for brick-masons is \$59,130 annually.

Carpenters: Carpenters are needed in all construction areas and are often employed throughout the entire construction process. Thus, it is one of the most secure jobs in the industry. The best carpenters are critical thinkers who are detail-oriented. Skilled carpenters earn \$52,400 annually.

First-Line Supervisors: Seasoned tradespeople have the opportunity to manage people and projects. First-line supervisors play a key role in making sure projects are completed on time and budget. The median wage for an employee in this role is \$74,330.
